A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR WOLF

It was September of 2001, and one of the most life changing moments of my life was in progress: Liberation Theology with Rev. Dr. Alonzo Johnson.

I know, when you hear September 2001, this likely isn't what sprung to mind because those of us who remember it cannot forget the events of the September 11, and to my dying day I'll remember standing in a room full of nearly 200 silent college students until we all collectively gasped as the second plane struck the second tower and I realized that the first was no accident.

My initial response was, "Wherever these people came from, we need to make a new lake in order to demonstrate that they can't do this to us and get away with it!". Over the next few days, I began to consider my theological position compared to my emotional response and heard the voice of Scripture speaking to my heart.

Live by the sword, die by the sword. (Matthew 26:52)

Come, behold the works of the Lord! See what desolations he has brought on the earth: The Lord makes wars cease to the end of the earth, breaks the bow, and shatters the spear; burns the shields with fire. "Be still, and know that I am God!" (Psalm 46:8-10a)

The Lord shall judge between many peoples, and shall arbitrate between strong nations far away; they shall beat their swords into plowshares and their spears into pruning-hooks. Nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war any more; but they shall all sit under their own vines and under their own fig trees and no one shall make them afraid; for the mouth of the Lord of hosts has spoken. (Micah 4:3-4)

These verses paraphrased with adjusted punctuation here, among others, rang through my heart and mind, and the most convicting of them all was Matthew 5:43-46:

[Jesus continued,] "You have heard that it was said, 'You shall love your neighbour and hate your enemy'. But I say to you, Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, so that you may be children of your Father in heaven; for he makes his sun rise on the evil and on the good, and sends rain on the righteous and on the unrighteous. For if you love those who love you, what reward do you have?

In my heart I prayed, "Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you? But Jesus, what about making a lake to get back at those evil plane people?"

Jesus replied in my heart, "Did I stutter?".

When I walked into Liberation Theology while wrestling my heart over the desire for revenge and the desire to follow Jesus as faithfully as possible, the reading for the day was the story of the assassination and martyrdom of Rev. Óscar de Romero, Archbishop of San Salvador. After completing his sermon and moving behind the altar to celebrate the Eucharist, a red car pulled up outside and a still unidentified assassin fired a bullet through his heart. His murder remains shrouded in mystery, but there were people from both warring sides and the superpowers bankrolling them who had reason to want him dead for his defiant message of love in the face of violence, welcoming both government troops and guerillas alike into worship.

Dr. Johnson asked, "Well, we just had our own violent attack here in this nation and I know a lot of you are feeling things about it. In the theology of liberation, we believe God is on the side of the poor and the powerless, and that justice will not go undone. What do you think God would have us do?".

I knew this one, I'd been mulling it over for weeks now and said, "I think Jesus would tell us to act with mercy. What would happen if we responded with kindness?".

Dr. Johnson looked at me and rolled his eyes as he replied, "Do you think God would really desire for this violent action to go unanswered? How is not responding going to accomplish God's justice and allow for the reckoning we believe will come?", and the rest of the conversation was about how to prosecute a just war. I really had no response, so I filed that away but continued to chew on it.

It's been 20 years now and I've yet to find a "just" war. Thanks to the two decades of studying and writing volumes as I processed this theology, I can give an answer that I believe takes seriously Jesus' question, "Did I stutter?".

A response of kindness isn't doing nothing. Responding with kindness is not only doing something, but it's the only way to preserve the dignity, lives, and livelihoods of the poor, the widowed, of children and other vulnerable people. It's the only way to protect soldiers from the horrors and indignities of war, and generals from the crisis of conscience in prosecuting it. Responding to atrocity with kindness, choosing human aid and relief, opting to demonstrate that our heart is steeped in love for those around us—that's doing something—but that something doesn't live into the values of our nation's penchant for the myth of "redemptive violence" in which killing the right people is what the hero must do in order to be heroic.

Responding to hate with love is to embrace the heart of the Gospel. I still wonder what might have happened if our response to 9/11 was the most robust humanitarian action ever taken, with acts of love and partnership, armies of reconciliation descending upon the populace of the places where we'd sowed so much venom in the blood we've shed for oil. I wonder, and every time I say it people respond, "That doesn't work!".

And I hear their voice and wonder how we know since it's never been tried?

Did Jesus stutter?

What might this world look like if we really took him seriously?
