ASH THURSDAY

Ash Wednesday is my favorite service of the entire liturgical calendar. I like it because it's honest in a way most of us try to avoid the rest of the year, and if we can't, it's because we live with those ashes falling on our nose every day due to some dis-ease or grief that brings it to the fore.

The image of ashes falling on our noses is one that's become a central piece of it for me, oddly enough. It's because I grew up in a congregation that imposed ashes like Jesus taught us: dry. Okay, that may have been Peter. More seriously, there's something in the dryness that matches the sobriety of the moment. The oily ashes that stay put just aren't messy enough to encompass the gritty reality. The mild abrasive feeling between finger and forehead calls me to a space of reverence, its authenticity leaves me with a few tears by the end. Children always receive it with a look of curiosity more than anything else, while adults seem to range from resignation, to acceptance, to anxiety, to any number of emotions upon hearing the words and feeling the imposition of ashes and pronouncement.

Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return.

Remember where you came from, my friend; and remember where you're going.

Ash Thursday is always a day that leaves me reflective in a way that Wednesday doesn't. On Wednesday I ponder my own humanity, my mortality, my responsibilities for services, my own self-awareness and self consciousness about all that the day implies. But Thursday is a day that always leads me to my vocation. I've pondered the grave. Now what do I do when the stone is rolled away from my heart and I can now live again?

At its core, I think this ironic focus is one of the chief reasons we celebrate Lent. Yes, our journey to the cross with Christ gets all the press because of its stark reality. Its cruelty reveals something of our human nature that frightens and thrills us. The bleakness of God suffering is such a powerful image because at some moment in all of our lives, there's been something akin to a wish that God would suffer as we do in the vain hope that this would cause God to somehow remake the world into something in which suffering doesn't exist for us.

God suffering with us and for us — God's suffering on display before us feels almost just to some I've talked to in their own grief, pain, and doubt. "If God can make it this way, he damn sure should live with it" were words that came from the mouth of a husband grieving his wife's death early on in my first job with hospice. These words stuck with me, because they revealed something deep in human nature about how fairness and justice should coexist.

The catch is that Lent really isn't about the cross any more than existence is about death.

We survey the wondrous cross upon which the King of Glory died, counting our greatest gains as loss — not because we lost the King of Glory that day, but because the end of the crucifixion narrative is a rolled stone, an empty tomb, a confused disciple as Mary saw it, confused disciples in hiding when she told the men what she saw, and faithful folks in the painful space between grief at Jesus' sensible death and inconceivable resurrection.

Easter Sunday was a day of wondrous confusion. Easter Monday was a day of everyone saying, "Well now what?".

This is Ash Thursday.

We heard that we are dust, and to dust we shall return — and now what? What do we do with our newfound remembrance? What do we do with the existential wrestling into which we're invited? How do we step forward into this reconceived liminal space of our existence between our times of being dust?

Ash Thursday means wrestling with the idea that life may be brief, but its brevity has purpose. "Here am I, Lord" are the words that Samuel spoke to Eli three times, until Eli realized that it was God calling and gave Samuel a response when the Lord spoke again. "Speak, for your servant is listening" (1 Samuel 3). What are we called to *do* with this time? We listen. We wait. We hope. We attend to what God puts into our hearts with minds whose posture follows the example of young Samuel — hearts and minds that are open to the new thing that God is about to proclaim that will make the hearts of God's people tingle.

The question of Ash Thursday is upon us: We're given this time, now what?

This isn't as personal a question as it may seem. Our faith is lived fully in the context of community. St. John is given this time, now what?

Who are we called to be? What are we called to value? What are we called to incarnate for the world around us? What are we called to become for the sake of the neighbors who God so loves? What are we called to do and hear and be that will make *our* hearts tingle when we as a congregation hear them?

The time is short, and yes we feel its urgency, yet God calls us to follow.

This might be the hardest thing, that though the shortness of time makes our hearts feel hurry, God seems to be plodding along. The act of discerning our vocation as a congregation is dwelling in the now but not yet, the ready but still. We're called to live as Samuel: open enough to listen, and prepared to act when the time comes.

My prayer for us is that we will take time to listen faithfully, and in so doing, remain prepared to speak when and what the Lord instructs.

CONFIRMATION CONNECTION

Confirmation classes this month are focusing on recognizing God's presence in the world around us. Why? Because often when we ask middle school students where they experience God, the answer is obvious to them: at church. They might experience God through a service project or when doing something with

their family. But that tends to be where their list ends. But if we ask someone with more life experience where they feel God's presence, the list is likely much longer: in nature, with someone they love, in music, through a book, in a movie or a tv program, at an athletic event, with delicious food, and the list goes on. Feeling God's closeness with us as we live our daily lives helps us to deepen our relationship with God. And sharing ideas about where we might see God



deepens our relationships with each other and helps us to build community.

On January 29th, we discussed our favorite books, tv shows, and movies. Our students have diverse tastes. Check in with them for recommendations as you select your next read or watch

session. We considered a favorite character—why we liked them, what we have in common with them, and what is

different about them. These stories give us a better understanding of ourselves and where we are or where we hope to go as we live our lives.



We used the movie **Onward**, the tale of two brothers hoping to reunite with their wizard father for one day and their crazy quest to do so, to inspire our own quest. After braving blind turns, crossing

an invisible bridge, breaking down a canyon wall, and, of course, finding a sweet reward, we used the **Onward** story to consider how we learn from our family members and how we sacrifice for those we love. And we wondered as we compared the brothers' experiences, our own experiences, and God and Jesus' experiences.

Sharing our favorite stories and our personal stories helps us to feel connected to others when we discover what we have in common or when they give us a peek into what is going on in "their world".
