KIDSPACE REDESIGN IS IN THE WORKS

Council has been discussing the future of Kidspace both as a physical space and as an opportunity for engagement in worship.

Our first phase is focusing on the safety issues for all worship participants. Now that the roof project is complete, the Kidspace platform will be removed and the pew anchors ground down so that we can prepare the floor for a new installed rug. Additionally, we will be installing a hand-hold on the center aisle to provide support for folks as they approach the altar. Our goal is to complete this phase before our Triumphal Return to the Sanctuary on September 26th.

Furthermore, we are rethinking the materials used in Kidspace in order to provide additional hands-on, age-appropriate ways for children to engage in worship. We are also developing "crossover" opportunities with Sunday school instruction to provide a better understanding of why we do and say what we do and say during worship.

AMIRAH PRAYER GATHERING | JULY 27TH AT 7:00 PM







WHO ARE WE REALLY?

One of the running themes for Jesus is a debate about who he is and what that means. Is he the son of Mary and Joseph? Is he the Son of Humanity / Creation (more traditionally Son of Man, but this gets to the meaning of it a little more clearly)? Is he the Son of God? Is he a prophet reincarnated? Is he Messiah? Is he all of them or none of them?

I get the sense that these questions aren't simply questions we ask or the disciples ask, or that the temple authorities asked. It seems like Jesus asks who people say that he is in order to get a sense for himself of what he is called to be. We believe clearly that Jesus is fully God and fully human. We believe clearly that Jesus is the one whose virgin birth allowed him to be born outside of our enslavement to Sin. We say that Jesus is perfect as God is perfect.

But what does "perfect" really mean?

By one definition, "perfect" is simply as good as it gets. In the vernacular of our time it has the sense of "without any flaw". So is the perfection of Jesus equivalent to the old trope about Jesus being able to pitch every game perfectly if he played baseball? Or perhaps "perfect" means Jesus would pass all the chemistry tests that I never could. Does the perfection of God mean that God never makes a mistake?

While the answer to the last is "yes, God doesn't make mistakes" according to most theologians and people, I do wonder what that means in practice. Especially given the fact that we have several accounts of God experiencing a change of mind or heart — which is a phrase we often describe in conjunction with the word repent. It sounds so strange to say, "God repented", but it's precisely the phrasing we see when God observes the wickedness of humanity before the flood. This is also the word used when God desires to wipe the Hebrew people off of the earth for worshiping Baal while Moses was communing with God on Mt. Sinai.

God sees that the people melted down their jewelry and grows angry, saying to Moses something along the lines of, "YOUR people are doing this!". Moses reminded God that these people aren't his own people, but these are God's people with whom God established covenants through Abraham and Isaac, and the forebears of their people and faith. It's at this point that God relented, in the KJV it reads that God repented, and in all places it's pretty clear that what God is intending in one moment is changed in the next.

Does perfection mean that one's first inclination is always correct?

God regretted the flood and promised never again to destroy humanity in such a way.

If perfection is being free from any mistake or at least never regretting any action, then it doesn't seem as if God doesn't fit this.

There's another way we can understand perfect though, and that's completely whole.

If we think in this way, we see that the perfection of God is actually something to which we already aspire—the relationship that makes us whole, a relationship with One who hears and sees us in a unique way. God is Wholeness, and I don't know about anyone else, but wholeness is something I've sought throughout my whole life.

God doesn't need Israel or creation. God loves Israel and creation. Throughout scripture, the most powerful forces at work are some combination of God's creative energy, God's love, and God's Divine Presence — a Presence which is both creative and destructive because God is the beginning and the end. Love is a verb, and verbs are always in motion.

Love also makes us vulnerable.

I believe to my core that this vulnerability is an immutable characteristic of love. We live out our love with others by sharing our deepest experiences, our most intimate physical and emotional moments, our darkest shames and our most aspirational hopes. Love doesn't demand, but it does desire. God is Love according to the letters of John, and therefore all that God does is done in love. God loves creation and has a desire for its return — and this isn't neediness or brokenness or evidence of a lack of wholeness, it's simply the nature of love to desire love in return.

And though God doesn't need us, because there's an immutable vulnerability in love, it hurts when the beloved spurns this love.

I don't have a good resolution for this, but this personification of the Divine and examining the Divine Character through this lens of love, we learn something interesting about who God demonstrates Godself to be through the incarnation of Jesus: love drives God to join us in this place and share our experiences with us because it's the ultimate expression of love. And to make the ultimate expression, God makes the necessary choice of ultimate vulnerability.

Who are we?

We are people whose wholeness is found in loving community, a space that loves us for who we are and creates a vulnerable space for us and claims a vulnerable space within us. Why does it hurt when we feel unheard in church? Why does it bother us differently when things go wrong with people at church? It's because there's something about the relationships of faith that access our heart more deeply than a lot of other relationships do.

We are a people called to be gentle with one another so that we can dwell in God's love.
