

MORE THAN ASPIRATIONS

As we near July Fourth, I find myself reflecting a lot on the meaning of the day. It means many things to people who reside within these borders.

This year, I find myself preoccupied with rulings by the Supreme Court, Cassidy Hutchinson's testimony under oath before the January 6th Committee, and in particular the words of Vice Chair of the January 6th Committee Rep. Liz Cheney.

I'm thinking of her words, because she speaks with the voice of the Republican party I remember in my youth. I was just a child when I remember President Reagan speaking of us being a shining city on a hill; when George HW Bush spoke about us being a thousand points of light back in the days when we had the luxury of *The Simpsons* being the most offensive thing many adults worried about. All us kids laughed about Barbara Bush going toe to toe with that show.

I'm thinking about Cheney's words, because they currently speak more about the hope of our nation than the fact of our nation. Now you might be asking why I'd speak about these things.

Precisely because the tension between hope and fact is a tension at the heart of the Christian experience and the human experience, not simply our current political reality, it's important to speak of the world we inhabit as plainly as the world for which we hope. When the words We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, endowed by our Creator with certain inalienable rights were penned, they were an aspirational address — hope for what we might be, not the fact of who we were or what we held, regardless of the source of its evidence.

Reagan's shining city on the hill was a rhetorical aspiration; the thousand points of light a dream of our best self.

Cheney spoke words to the effect that this is a moment when we abandon political party and become Americans. I'm so drawn to this because I see so very clearly in the Christian tradition the words that call us to our better selves, not on our own behalf, but on behalf of the love endowed by our Creator, that our hearts beat for others because God's heart beats for us all.

We proclaim forgiveness of sins, and though it's real, this is somewhat aspirational, too. We proclaim forgiveness, blessing, healing, hope, relief and release as a means of achieving a foretaste of what will come in its fullness. But that's not really what's so aspirational about our hope in the Christian faith.

Reagan's hope was that somehow we could become that beacon by our own efforts, power, and faithfulness — but it's such a seductive works righteousness that undermines the vision from scriptures of the city on the hill which cannot be hidden. We have hope for what we might work to become in our nation, but the city on the hill in Matthew is already self-evident in its inability to be hidden. It's describing what *is*, not what we hope might be. This is the work of God's love, God's grace, God's hope; God's transformative presence that calls us into life together even as the Senate might rage around us, SCOTUS rulings roar and foam, Presidents come and go, and trials convene and recess. It's not the hope of life that God's grace calls us to. Life in God is life realized. Hope in Christ is hope achieved. God's grace is mercy revealed.

So in a world of aspirations while I find myself preoccupied by all the goings on, I pray that I can instead fix my sight on what is Real.

It's true, these things all matter and we live in a moment that demands our sober attention. It's also true that we don't live for aspirations as God's people, but in the context of promises fulfilled; God with us already.

As Reagan borrowed from Jesus, I'm borrowing it back to say that we at St. John are the city on the hill that cannot be hidden. We are seen, we are known, we are called and commissioned in this community to bear in our hearts and hands the love that God has instilled in us. The question now is, what will we do with it?


FEATURED CHILDREN'S BOOK FOR JULY


