#### **BECOMING SOMEONE**

While Peter was still speaking, the Holy Spirit fell upon all who heard the word. The circumcised believers who had come with Peter were astounded that the gift of the Holy Spirit had been poured out even on the Gentiles, for they heard them speaking in tongues and extolling God. Then Peter said, "Can anyone withhold the water for baptizing these people who have received the Holy Spirit just as we have?" So he ordered them to be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ. Then they invited him to stay for several days.

—Acts 10:44-48

You don't eat with those people.

It's pretty easy to identify *those people*. They're the others; the not-like-us. They're from "off". They root for the other team. They worship at another church or in another denomination or not at all. They vote differently or find different things important.

Those people feature frequently in my mind because I know what it's like to be one of them— I've been them an awful lot in my life because my personality is sort of borderline appropriate in a lot of circles. I'm fine with who I am, but I have to be careful in "polite" company because I grew up around impolite folks on construction sites, and it always sits at the back of my mind that I have to be careful not to be too honest about what I'm thinking most of the time. Even so, it's easy for me to pass when I know I need to or want to. My insecurities are inconvenient, but they aren't life threatening or career ending. My skin, my gender identity, my orientation, my social class, my employment status and chosen field; all of these put me in a set of very fortunate circumstances.

I remember a line in *Lethal Weapon*, where Danny Glover's character Murtaugh says to Mel Gibson's character Riggs, "sometimes I think God hates me". Riggs replies with classic Gibsonian bravado, "well hate him back, it's always worked for me". There's a logic in that, and we see it throughout the history of human existence.

"You hate me? Well I hate you more!"

"You hurt me, I'm going to hurt someone else."

Maybe we don't say that out loud, but what the scene from both *Lethal Weapon* and the following two sentences say is true of many people who are (or feel) abused and marginalized. Hurting people hurt people. The cycle of abuse has less to do with any of the actual issues at hand and more to do with the sense of pain spinning up unspendable impotent energy and emotion that needs somewhere to go, and most frequently our targets are the ones we love. If you want to know when spouses fight most, it's when one of them is hurting and can't even begin to share it in a healthy way.

The cycle of abuse comes in a lot of forms, but very few of them are because someone's just a bad egg. It's just the case that these sorts of wounds just roll downhill until it finds someone vulnerable enough to take the pass.

Cain made an offering to God, but God preferred Abel's offering to Cain's. We don't have to stretch very far to come up with an internal dialogue for this one. "Isn't that just the way? Everyone prefers Abel to me. Mom and Dad are constantly talking about what a good guy he is. But me? Nope. Even God prefers Abel to me, and look, there he is now...let's see them prefer this".

The older brother in the parable of the Prodigal Son, in which we learn the one who was truly prodigal was the older brother. He was always jealous of the fact that his younger brother never seemed to face any consequences no matter how badly or often he fouled things up. We end that parable with the words of

grace from their father to his faithful angry son, and are left to wonder what happened after. Life can be like this, lots of pain and very few answers.

This can be true theologically as well.

In the Bible, there are many Psalms that look for the righteous deliverance of God, a restoration of fortunes, anew hope and an indwelling of God's presence. It's all fun and games until the psalmist begins calling for the blood of their enemies, for the death of their children, for the razing of their cities and the desolation of their whole nation — all because, conveniently, God hates the same people the psalmist hates.

Pain, anger, and a feeling of unfairness are powerful narcotics and cause hallucinations in all sorts of ways.

God's people had been in and out of slavery, domination, subjugation, and bad situations for generations. It seemed like the most constant constant for their entire existence was that they would fall into and out of favor with God. It doesn't matter to me that they're Jewish; it doesn't really have a thing to do with their religion. The important thing is that they're *people*, and their real identity is, "we are those people".

In order to preserve their culture, their language, their religion, their land, their own sense of identity, they developed a tightly knit cultural ethic that kept *those* people out. After generations of abuse, suspicions about anyone who isn't *us* were at an all-time high. They identified who was in and who was out by where they prayed, to whom they prayed, what they ate, what they wore, who they associated with, and so many other rules and customs that were designed to protect them, but in the end just caused rift after rift after rift.

They were good people, and they were hurting people. They were good people, and they hurt people by excluding them and punishing insiders who transgressed. The Jewish people aren't extraordinary for this in any way except that they are the ones who represent a of us by being extraordinarily human so that we can see God, who is in no way ordinary, demonstrate just what love can do.

Don't we all imagine sometimes that God only likes us? That only we really get it? That everyone else is close, but holy cow, we've got it?

The beginning of Acts 10 is God instructing Cornelius to send for Peter, and Peter having a vision in a dream of a sheet with all sorts of animals that he was instructed to eat, and Peter's protest that he's a good Jew and hasn't ever eaten anything unclean.

What God has made clean, you must not call profane.

Peter preached, and God's Holy Spirit descended and caused them to speak in tongues, praising God.

What God has made clean, you must not call profane.

Finally, Peter understood.

God's Holy Spirit fills us all, calls us all, heals us all. We receive God's Spirit, still hurting and hurting others, but we're called to heed these words spoken to Peter in a vision.

What God has made clean, you must not call profane.

It's not just about *those people*. Well, it is, only not in the way we think. It's about that place in our hearts where we fear that we are those people, and in that pain we hurt others by *making them become others to us*.

What God has made clean, you must not call profane.

This is a message to remind us how to treat our neighbor, but maybe more it's about having mercy on ourselves so that we might show that mercy to others.

God has made you holy, don't dare treat yourself otherwise.



## **SITUATION REPORT**

### **COVID-19 CRISIS IN INDIA**

MAY 3, 2021

#### **SITUATION**

In the past weeks, a surge of COVID-19 cases has ravaged India. India recorded over 400,000 new COVID-19 cases on April 30, the most ever recorded in any country during the pandemic. While thousands of deaths are recorded each day, the number of deaths is suspected to be much higher than reported.

#### **RESPONSE**

For the past year, Lutheran Disaster Response has continuously supported partners and companion churches throughout India to respond to COVID-19. These partners include:

- Andhra Evangelical Lutheran Church
- Bodo Evangelical Lutheran Church
- Lutheran World Service India Trust
- Manipur Evangelical Lutheran Church
- Padhar Hospital in Madhya Pradesh
- United Evangelical Lutheran Churches in India

They are supporting communities by distributing food and hygiene kits to vulnerable populations, conducting livelihood training for migrants, sharing information about COVID-19, and promoting prevention practices.

LDR is currently gathering updates from partners and companion churches to plan for continued support.
