



Ministry continues!

Place Compelling Title Here is what was intended to begin a journal exercise this morning to limber up the old brain for a day of writing and editing. After writing it, it seemed to fit with a theme in the Gospels of the last few months as we enter into the last four weeks of Sundays after Pentecost and Advent begins.

Beginning with Luke 15 on September 11, we encountered an increasingly challenging set of parables that I addressed in the last newsletter article in some detail. This week we have the parable of the Pharisee and the Tax Collector, who both went to the temple to pray (with hilarious results?). On Reformation we'll examine the Gospel story about Zacchaeus, then the Beatitudes, an apocalypse, and on Reign of Christ Sunday (Christ the King) we endure together the crucifixion of Jesus.

Ink will be spilled.

Words will be said.

Feelings will be felt.

And all that before Advent.

I imagine this conversation feels somewhat random, but random kind of feels like the best description for this moment in the world. There are wars and rumors of wars; storms, floods, and disasters intensified by global climatic shift; signs in the stars (from a new telescope, and NASA smashing big money into an asteroid); disease, crop losses, water issues, and so on. In a dramatic scene from one of the great cinematic triumphs of our time, there's a compelling reading of such times in the rising action for the final conflictual climactic act of the film:

Dr. Peter Venkman: This city is headed for a disaster of biblical proportions!

Mayor: What do you mean, "biblical"?

Dr. Raymond Stantz: What he means is Old Testament, Mr. Mayor, real wrath of God type stuff.

Dr. Peter Venkman: Exactly.

Dr. Raymond Stantz: Fire and brimstone coming down from the skies! Rivers and seas boiling!

Dr. Egon Spengler: Forty years of darkness! Earthquakes, volcanoes...

Winston Zeddemore: The dead rising from the grave!

Dr. Peter Venkman: Human sacrifice, dogs and cats living together... MASS HYSTERIA!

Mayor: All right, all right! I get the point!

Of course I'm certain you recognize that this masterpiece is exactly what one might anticipate, *Ghostbusters*. What's so fascinating here is that they spent the entire film capturing ghosts in a growing paranormal threat to the city — and of course, the world. Despite the fact that they'd done this, people still wouldn't believe them when they tried to describe the magnitude of the threat they faced.

This is perhaps the most absolutely believable event in all of movie history. It reminds me of The Parable of the Lazarus and the Rich Man. They both die, and Lazarus goes to rest in Abraham's bosom while the rich man is subjected to torment for his lack of human compassion for Lazarus who dwelled in poverty and suffered outside his door. We find our characters "in Hades, where he was being tormented, he looked up and saw Abraham far away with Lazarus by his side."

Drama Intensifies:

Rich Man: Father Abraham, have mercy on me, and send Lazarus to dip the tip of his finger in water and cool my tongue; for I am in agony in these flames!

Abraham: Child, remember that during your lifetime you received your good things, and Lazarus in like manner evil things; but now he is comforted here, and you are in agony.

Besides all this, between you and us a great chasm has been fixed, so that those who might want to pass from here to you cannot do so, and no one can cross from there to us.

Rich Man: Then, father, I beg you to send Lazarus to my father's house! I have five brothers! Let him warn them, so that they will not also come into this place of torment.

Abraham: They have Moses and the prophets; they should listen to them.

Rich Man: No! Father Abraham, if someone goes to them from the dead, they will repent.'

Abraham: If they do not listen to Moses and the prophets, neither will they be convinced *even if someone rises from the dead!*

Annnnnnd scene! We end with what I'm certain must be a star wipe.

Literal ghosts literally ghosting all over the literal place wasn't enough for the Mayor, the EPA, and the city to believe these folks who'd been literally catching these literal ghosts all over these literal places!

Despite a million dead, just yesterday, I had what turned out to be a painfully patient interaction with an individual who denies that it's "really all that bad".

What does it *take* to make us believe? What *is* the (most likely overblown) statement that can turn us on our ears so that we see life in a new way? What do we do with a skepticism that runs so deep that even being confronted with people recently risen from the dead no longer fazes us?

What's so fascinating to me is that after all this in both the Gospel and in Ghostbusters, the next act indicates society doesn't really don't change much no matter how significant an event is in its history. At the beginning of Ghostbusters 2, Winston explains: "...we conjured up a hundred-foot marshmallow man, blew the top three floors off an uptown high-rise, and ended up getting sued by every city, county, and state

agency in New York". Being sued into oblivion, they were performing at children's parties. In the Gospels, Jesus is crucified and is literally resurrected from the literal dead, yet in Acts we hear a lot of the same things we heard in the Gospels about infighting, posturing, and an unwillingness to acknowledge that the movement Jesus began was bigger than their limited understanding of it. It feels disappointing when you put it that way.

What surprises me is that this truth feels somehow strangely hopeful, too.

Even though we may never change as a culture in some ways we sincerely wish we would; and even though there's only so much we can do to circumvent our captivity to Sin from which we cannot free ourselves, we hear the good news that God never changes either. God's loving grace, forgiving posture, beckoning hand, and desire that we hear the welcoming call of our Creator is an ongoing eternal act of God's love — which is the impetus for creation itself.

God doesn't change. Knowing this, we realize that whatever God's plan might include, it includes this fact about us and takes it into account in God's Divine Plan.

It all goes on.

Ink will be spilled.

Words will be said.

Feelings will be felt.

I rejoice that I managed to use climatic and climactic in the same paragraph.

I will feel satisfied that my newsletter article is finished.

Ministry will continue.

And together, we will give thanks for the things that bring hope, joy, love, and peace that break in to disrupt our lives in ways both distressing and hopeful.

Thanks be to God.


